A Lifeline from Lalgadh

Old age, disability, hunger, local thieves, the monsoon, a disintegrating house, Covid-19 anxiety, lockdown, no caring family: all these make life so very hard when you are elderly.

Community staff at Lalgadh Hospital heard about a leprosy-affected couple living about an hour's drive from the hospital. Marichman, aged 85, and his wife Radika Maya were struggling with food shortage, blindness, leprosy,

disability and ill health. A couple of months earlier the hospital outreach team had delivered rations to them and others (pandemic support; rice, lentils, oil, soap and masks). After their visit, however, someone entered the monsoon-damaged house through a hole in the back wall and stole the food.

A medical team then brought both Marichman and Radika Maya to Lalgadh Hospital. They

were given a good meal and a full medical check-up including X-Rays and blood tests.

The ophthalmic officer examined Radika Maya's infected left eye. After cleaning and treatment, her eyesight is now restored. Staff gave them medicines and a change of clothes and set up a small Lalgadh Hospital fund, from which they will receive a pension every month, before taking them back home.

Marichman has quite severe leprosy deformities and disabilities. He first caught leprosy 40 years ago. Without treatment the disease progressed and affected his eyes, hands and feet. He first came to Lalgadh Hospital about 25 years ago, by which time he already had advanced deformities. He is blind in his left eye and only partially sighted in his right eye. He has lost his fingers and some toes, and wrist-drop has made his right hand almost useless. He also suffered pulmonary tuberculosis 20 years ago.

Radika Maya is stiff with arthritis and, because of her eye infection, she has been unable to open her left eye for the past 2 months.

Covid-19 Update

Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital staff and patients are doing well despite Covid-19, monsoon rain and mosquitoes. The national lockdown since March has been very difficult for many. Death, disease and disability rates have risen from other causes including leprosy as people in remote villages can't get to health posts or hospital. Many poorer people rely on hand-to-mouth daily labour and income for survival, which has all ceased.

Nepal has been hard hit by Covid-19 infection. Total numbers are currently 215,020 cases and Covid-deaths of 1,276 (November 20th 2020). Testing takes place only in the main centres. With more remote areas unreached the numbers are likely to be an

underestimate and causes of death are often undiagnosed. NLT's area of work, Province 2, with its 6.01 million inhabitants, is the worstaffected area, adjacent to the Indian border.

As transmission and infection rates continue to rise in villages around Lalgadh Hospital, our front-line staff keep their guard up, wearing protective masks, gowns, gloves, (PPEs) despite the current monsoon heat.

The hospital is a safe haven in the midst of the pandemic. Entry is allowed only after fevertesting at the double-barrier gate. It is a great blessing that no staff have been affected to date, although quarantine was required for one nurse, one doctor and one health worker.
